#### **Rector Reflection**


Pentecost was May 19th this year. The Sundays that follow Pentecost are called 'Ordinary Time'. I have always struggled with this title because after Pentecost what could ever be 'Ordinary' again? After all, God is with us! Our Creator, Covenantor, Redeemer, Sustainer and Sanctifier. If there is any way we can use 'Ordinary' to describe half of the year in the cycle of Scripture readings it is that this season is GREEN. Deep, juicy, vibrant, dynamic green. What is ordinary is growing. What is ordinary is becoming more and more conformed to the image of Christ in our prayers, our interior spiritual growth, and most of all in love. The Sundays after Pentecost (which usually number 24-27 depending on the year) challenge us to go deep. To open ourselves to the teachings of Christ and pray for transformation and growth. We are gathered as a community of seekers who have been sought by God. We are gathered as a community to believers who are ever learning how to trust God's love and promises more profoundly. We are gathered as a community who stake our lives on hope and the faithfulness of God. I think, then, that the word 'Ordinary' is aspirational. The GREEN season, the Sundays after Pentecost give us the opportunity to make a vibrant, growing faith a reality by regular prayer, study of the Word and gathering as the Body of Christ to worship. THIS is what is Ordinary? Yes! The 'Ordinary' is quite 'ExtraOrdinary'! It is staking our very lives on the gift of God's love and presence with us every day, every hour. Blessings for much growth in this GREEN season of growth in our discipleship.

#### Junior Warden's Report - More Capital Improvements!

Addcox Heating completed the annual maintenance of our furnaces last week. Two issues were brought to our attention:

- 1. Addcox Heating recommended that we urgently replace the three oldest furnaces. The insides are rusted and could fail. If this were to happen carbon monoxide would be released into the heated air and create a dangerous situation. As a result, we received a bid for 3 high efficiency furnaces to replace the failing ones. The Finance Team and Vestry are working on how we will pay for it.
- 2. A new thermostat is being installed outside the furnace room. This will help the new furnaces to work more efficiently. It will be programmed for a regular schedule of building usage. This will heat the undercroft & education wing more evenly. Please do not adjust the thermostat as this could create an imbalance in the heating cycle, create discomfort, and likely more gas consumption.

Also, a new thermostat is being installed on the two gas furnaces that heat the Sanctuary. The Junior Warden team discovered the current thermostat had failed. That thermostat will remain in its current position. Please do not adjust the Sanctuary thermostat. It will be programmed to reflect the usage of the Sanctuary. The goal is to provide comfortable settings for our high use times. Doing so will save us energy by reducing the temperatures during the low usage times.

# Remembering Timothy Pettis July 6 @ 10:00 am - 5:00 pm

You are invited to join with people of good will at Sunset Memorial Park—south of Coos Bay, Oregon—for a memorial service to remember Timothy Pettis. Recovering the story of Timothy's unsolved and brutal murder on July 6, 1924, on the docks of Coos Bay has called together people of good will to provide him the burial service he never received. The memorial will be a time of reflection and prayer for Mr. Pettis—and for us as we mourn and recognize the ongoing moral blight of racism in our own time.

# Who was Timothy "Frank" Pettis?

Timothy Pettis was a World War I Army veteran, working as janitor for the Bank of Southwestern Oregon. He grew up in Florida, where his father was a Baptist preacher.

On the night of July 6, he played pool with some friends and later went to a 24-hour restaurant that was filled with sailors off the USS Shirk. A sailor claimed that Timothy Pettis had a knife (a claim that his companions denied). He was last seen alive being chased by the police.

On the morning of July 12, a tugboat operator for the local lumber mill found his body floating in Isthmus Slough with no marks of violence on it...except that he had been castrated. Despite statewide attention after an appeal to the governor from local citizens, the murder has never been solved, and Mr. Pettis's story slipped into obscurity for a century.
